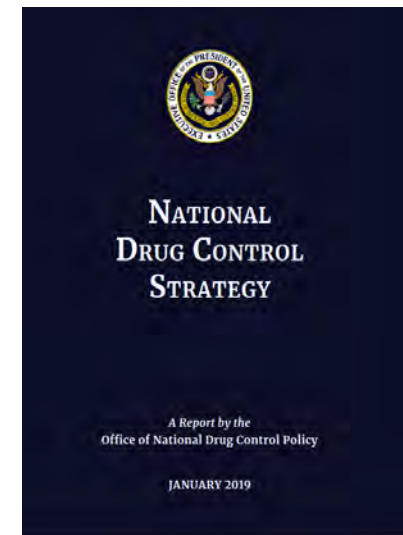
The National Drug Control Strategy has three lines of effort:

Treatment and Recovery: Improve quality, increase access, and reduce barriers

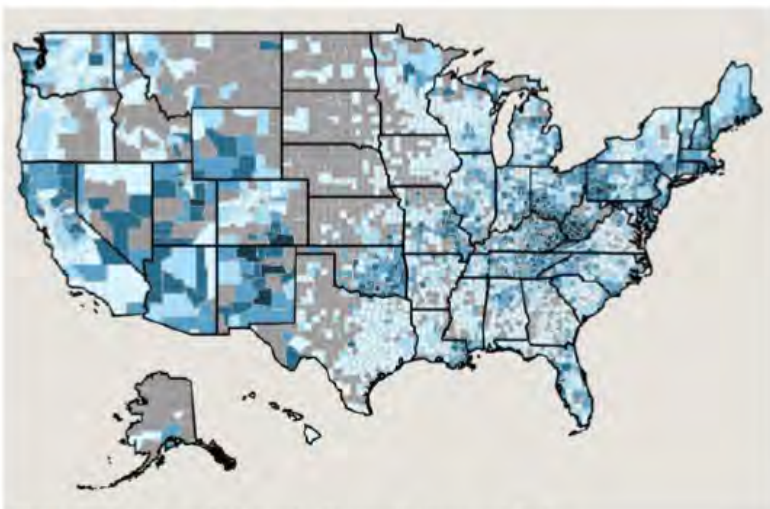
Supply Reduction

"Local leaders in small towns across our country need access to user-friendly and relevant data to help them build grassroots solutions for prevention, treatment and recovery."

- In 2018, USDA partnered with NORC to develop an interactive online community assessment tool to provide local leaders with access to user friendly and relevant data.
- This was created to respond to a need in rural communities to better understand the problem at their door step.

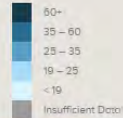

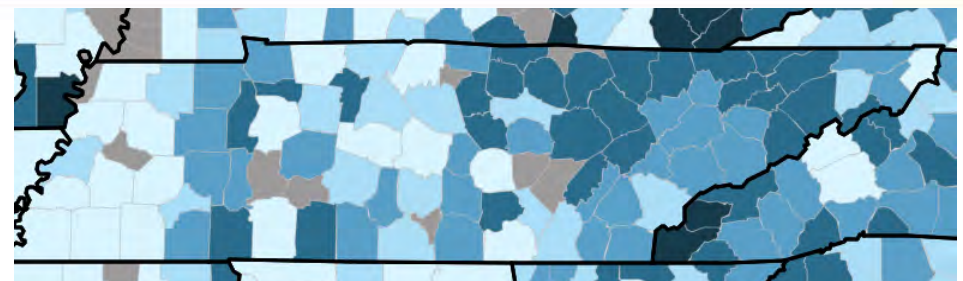

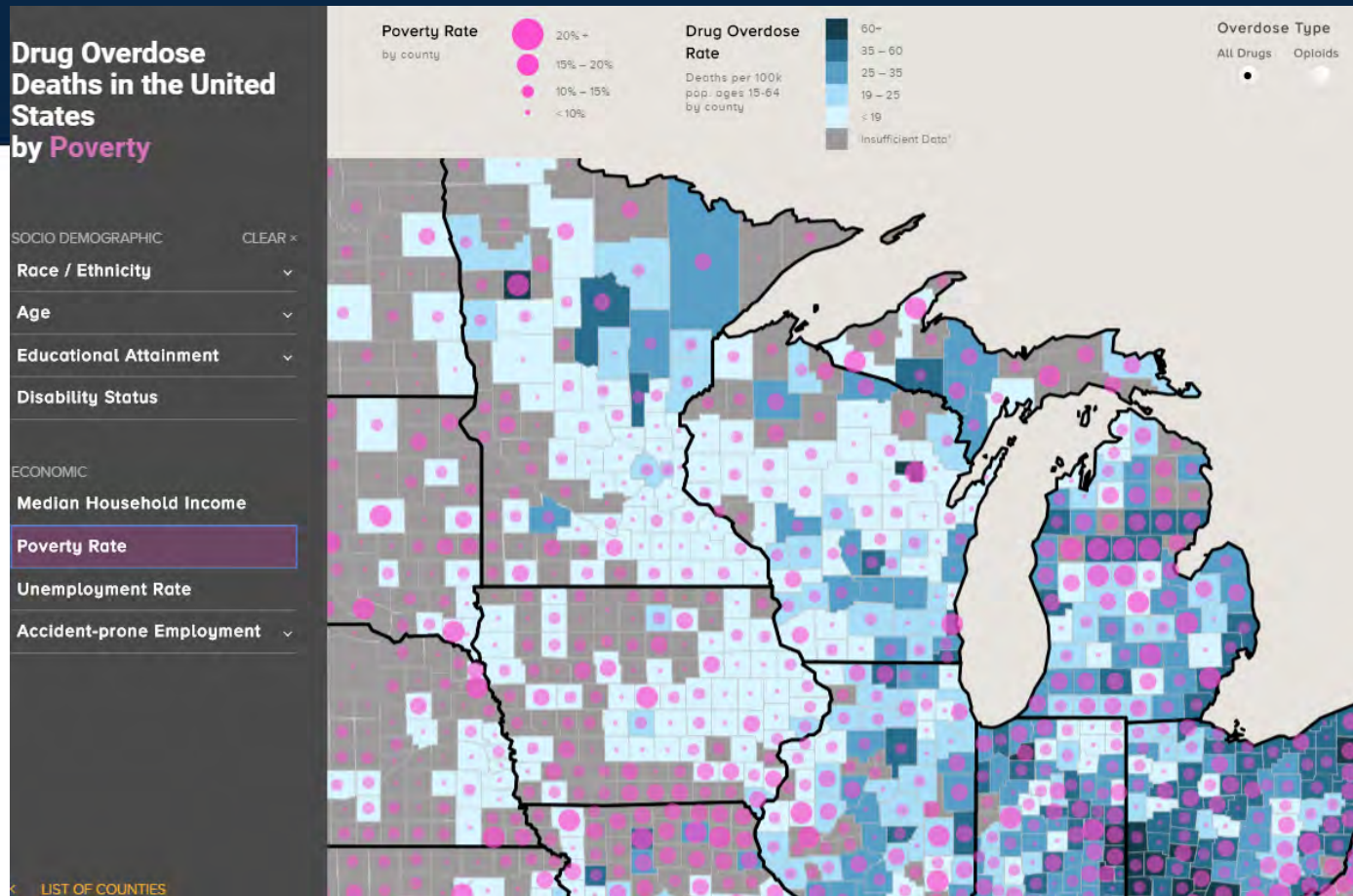


Socio-demographic and Economic Overlays

In May 2018, the Office of National Drug Control Policy (ONDCP) stood up a Rural Opioid Federal Interagency Working Group to help address the opioid crisis by improving coordination of and reducing potential overlap among the Federal responses in the Nation's rural communities. The IWG is co-chaired by ONDCP and USDA. This document is the first output, a guide to the resources that can help make a difference in your communities.

Federal Funding Examples:

- **FY2018 Magoffin County, KY** received a USDA grant to support a mobile health clinic for the Magoffin County Health Department to increase access to SUD treatment services. The mobile unit will travel to remote areas of the county and provide educational outreach to local schools.
- **FY2018 WV and OH collaboration:** received a USDA grant to purchase telemedicine equipment for 8 different locations in Hancock, Marshall and Brook counties, West Virginia and Jefferson county Ohio to bring behavioral health services to rural communities.
- **FY2018 Mariposa County, CA:** received a USDA grant for mobile telehealth carts at 7 county facilities. The project connects Mariposa County Human Services clinics throughout the County with local hospital, county jail and high school delivering mental health, opioid treatment and addiction services to county residents.



Federal Funding Examples:

- **&FY2018 IA/Pottawattamie, IA/Polk, MI/Kalamazoo, IA/Clarke, IA/Decatur:** Clarke County Hospital received support from USDA to address childhood trauma, facilitate and deliver professional development and ongoing implementation support to eleven rural schools via distance learning
- **&FY2018 Care South Carolina:** received a HRSA grant to develop the consortium/infrastructure needed to drive and carry out a unified regional plan for increasing access to SUD prevention, treatment, and recovery services
- **&FY2018 Clinton County, Iowa** received a DOJ-BJA grant to increase community collaboration with a multidisciplinary team to address high frequency utilizers of multiple systems. A Drug Abuse Response Team (DART) will be implemented that includes the Clinton Police Department, Clinton Fire Department and a treatment provider to respond to 100 percent of overdose victims and provide victim resources while connecting them with interventions or treatment options. Also a MAT program will be implemented to provide peer recovery support services, cognitive behavioral therapy, and case management.

- [& Integrated Mobility Innovation \(IMI\) Program grants. Deadline: August 6.](#) This opportunity from the Federal Transit Administration will fund projects that demonstrate innovative and effective practices, partnerships and technologies to enhance public transportation effectiveness, increase efficiency, expand quality, promote safety and improve the traveler experience.

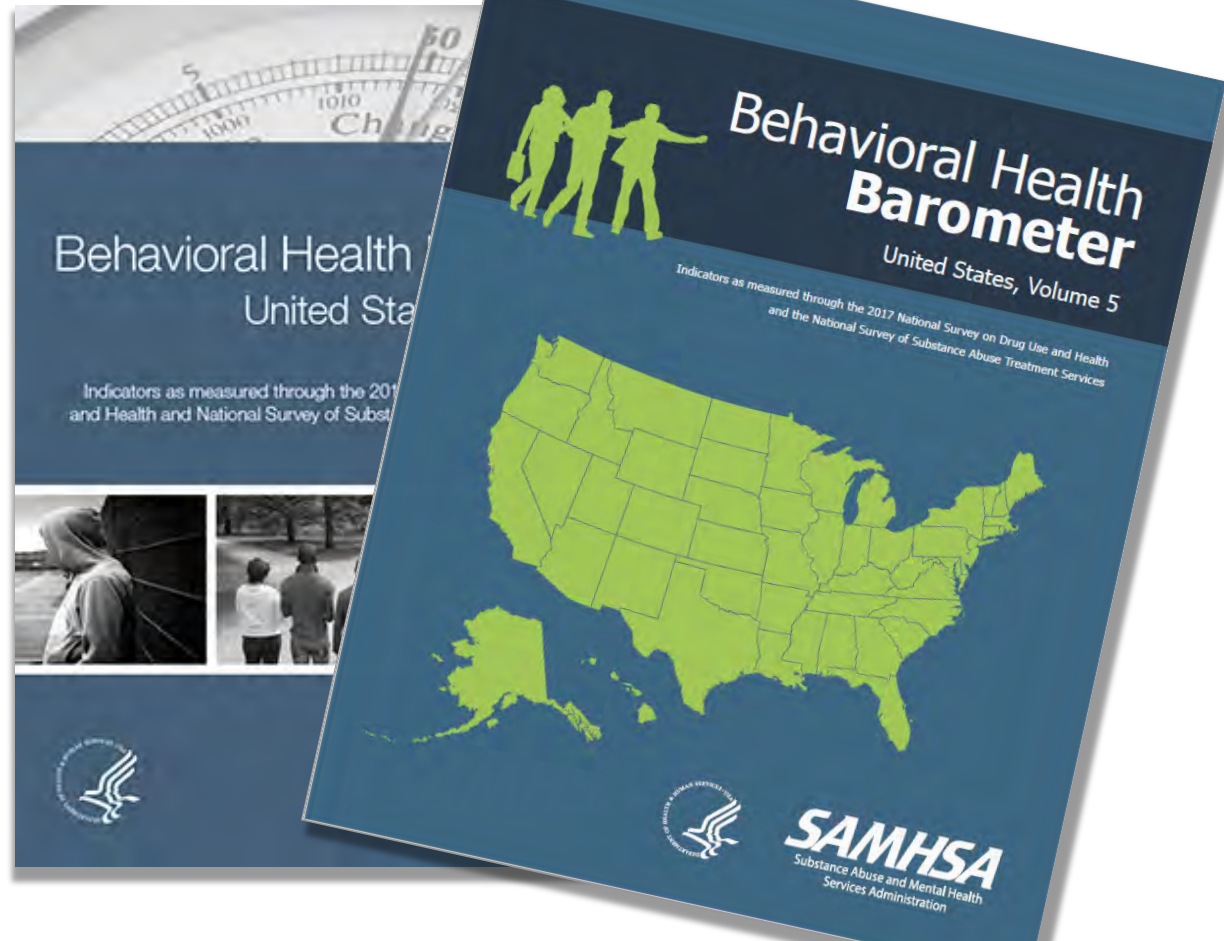

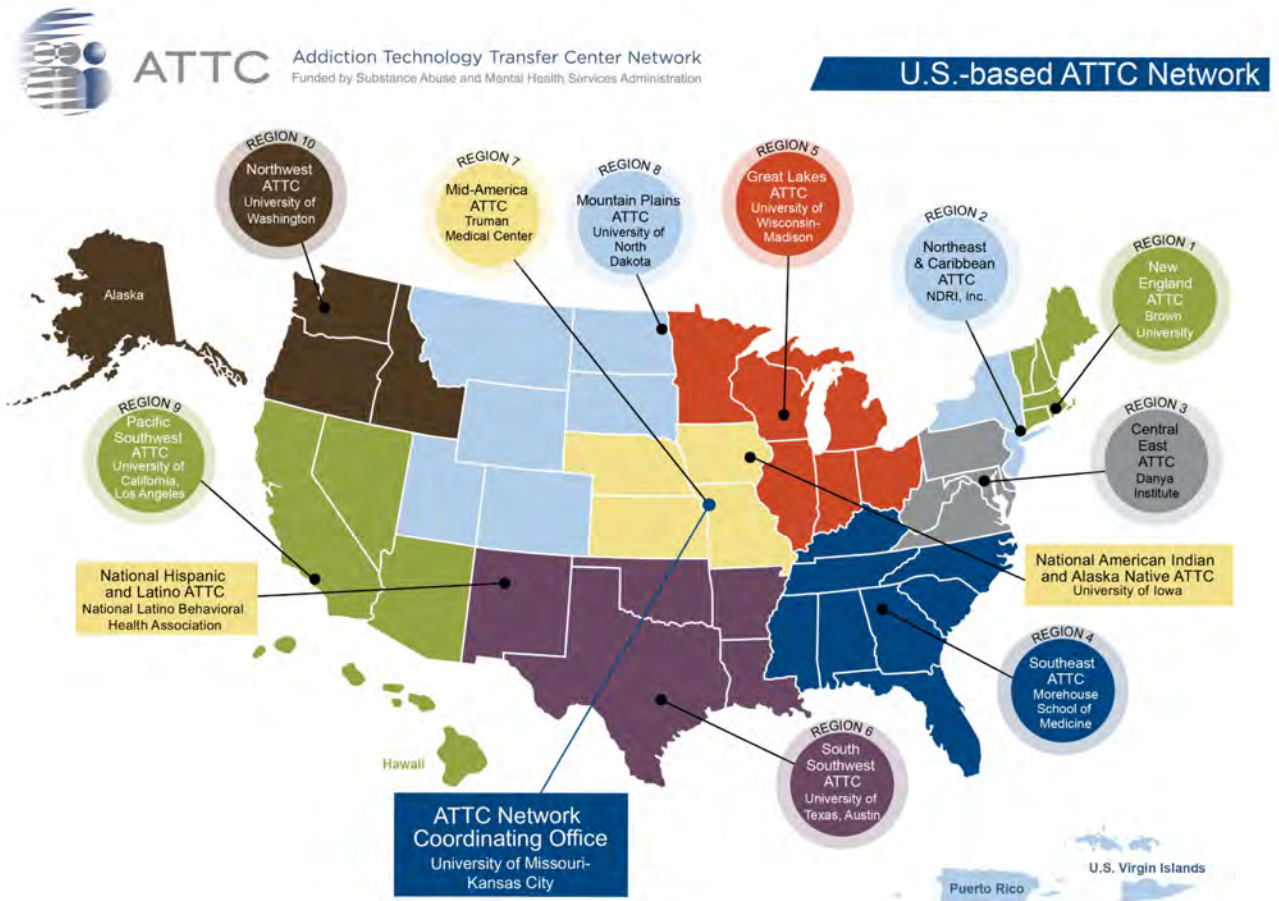

Using an online portal (coming in late 2018) and app (coming in 2019), the project offers expert consultation services and learning opportunities nationwide to support clinicians — including physicians, nurses, psychologists, recovery specialists, peer-to-peer specialists, and others— who provide evidence-based care for individuals with SMI. The CSS-SMI project website is expected to launch in late 2018.

PCSS-MAT is a national training and clinical mentoring project developed in response to the prescription opioid misuse epidemic and the availability of pharmacotherapies to treat opioid use disorder. PCSS- MAT trains health professionals to provide effective, evidence-based, medication-assisted treatments to patients with opioid use disorder in primary care, psychiatric care, substance use disorder treatment, and pain management settings.

Cicatelli Associates Inc., in partnership with the Legal Action Center (LAC), received a five year grant to establish one National Center of Excellence to develop and disseminate training, technical assistance, and educational resources for healthcare practitioners, families, individuals, states, and communities on various privacy laws and regulations as they relate to information about mental and substance use disorders. These include: the Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act (HIPAA) and 42 CFR Part 2. 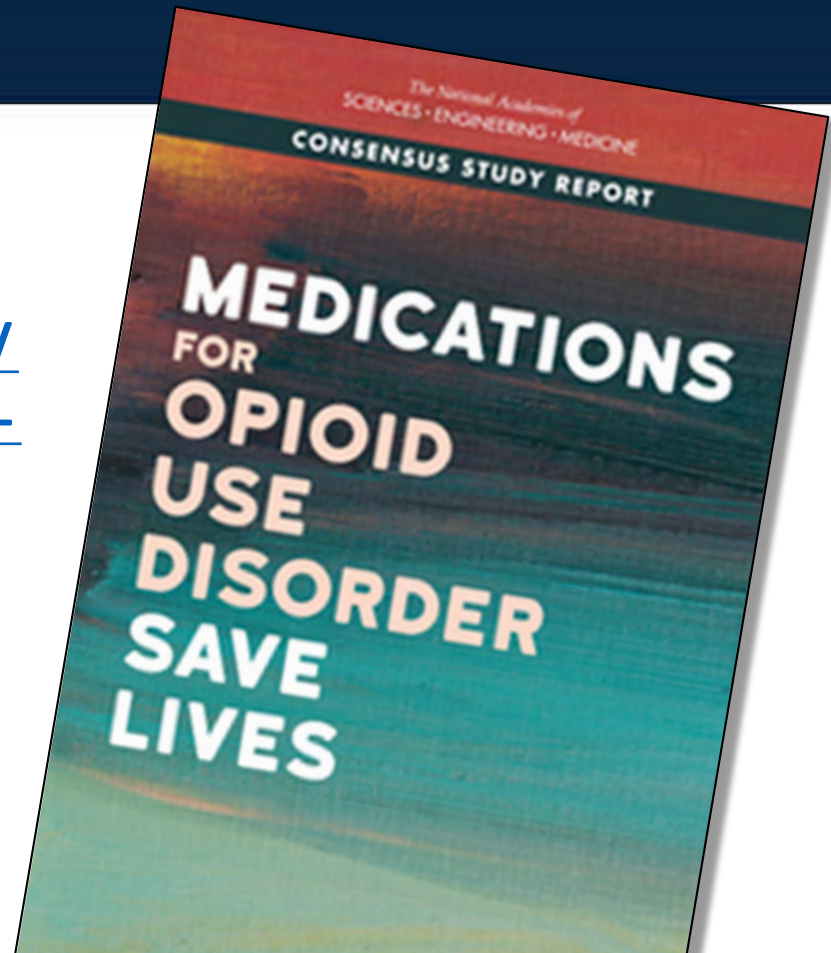
